

BOOK REVIEW

THE BOOK OF LOST NAMES

By Kristin Harmel

This is a book of historical fiction that takes place in France during World War 2. The main characters are Eva and Remy. They were both forgers who developed thousands of fake documents so that Jewish children could escape the Nazis.

Eva decided that while they gave the children phony names to put on their documents, they needed to have their real names recorded somewhere so that hopefully some day they could be reunited with their parents. These names were placed in the pages of an ancient religious book with the aide of a secret code that they developed. The book was housed in the library of the church in which they secretly did their work. Hence, the Book of Lost Names.

Eva and Remy fell in love, this love affair was not without obstacles. The most challenging of which was that Eva's mother was opposed to it on the grounds that she wanted Eva to marry a Jewish boy. She felt that marriage to a non-Jew would mean that she would be abandoning her family as well as her community, which was already in grave danger.

The mother got her way when Eva and Remy were separated by the demands of the Jewish resistance movement in which they served. Each presumed the other was murdered by the Nazis.

This is a story of individuals who exhibited amazing courage in the face of extreme danger. It also told not only of the great and undying love Eva and Remy had for each other, but also of their devotion to the tasks which saved countless Jewish lives.

The book was extremely well written and was a real page -turner. I would most highly recommend it.

Jews to Know



Mikael Dolsten (1958-) Pharmaceutical Scientist

Mikael Dolsten was born in Halmstad, Sweden to Jewish parents. His mother had escaped from Austria soon after WWII broke out. His home was not very religiously observant. Some visits to

Israel as a youth led him to spend a year of his doctoral studies at Weizmann Institute in Israel, where he was exposed to cutting-edge immunology research.

Dolsten began his career as a physician on the medical faculty of the Univ. of Lund, Sweden. He focused on immunology and oncology. He then did research in the private Swedish companies Pharmacia, and next Astra AB (that became AstraZeneca). Dolsten immigrated to the US in 2004 at the request of his then-employer Wyeth. He ended up at US "big pharma" company Pfizer Inc. In 2010, he was named Pfizer's chief science officer, the head of research and development. Under Dolsten's leadership, Pfizer completed development and/or testing of several significant medicines including Eliquis and Ibrance.

The worldwide Covid-19 epidemic began at the end of 2019. Pharmaceutical labs around the world raced to produce tests and vaccines against the virus that causes it. Pfizer was one of the first to develop a Covid vaccine, based on synthesized mRNA, that was both safe and effective in reducing the chance of contracting a severe case of Covid. People who were vaccinated could still get Covid, but if they did get infected, they would typically have only a mild case, so their odds of dying from this virus would be greatly reduced.

As of 2022, Dolsten continues to be involved in the direction of research at Pfizer. He and his wife (a Jewish doctor) live in the New York metropolitan area. S
