

Jews to Know

Norman Milton Lear

July 27, 1922 – December 5, 2023

Norman Lear was a highly influential American television writer and producer, born in New Haven, Connecticut to parents of Russian-Jewish descent. He is also the Society for Humanistic Judaism's 2025-26 Humanistic Jewish role

model. Lear produced, wrote, created, or developed over 100 shows, including *Maude*, *Sanford and Son*, *One Day at a Time*, *The Jeffersons*, and *Good Times*. But he was probably best known for *All in the Family*. The show revolves around the life of a working-class man and his family. It broke ground by introducing challenging and complex issues into mainstream network television comedy: racism, antisemitism, infidelity, homosexuality, women's liberation, rape, religion, miscarriage, abortion, breast cancer, the Vietnam War, menopause, divorce, and impotence. The series became arguably one of television's most influential comedies, as it injected the sitcom format with more dramatic moments and realistic, topical conflicts. The working-class father Archie and mother Edith were partly inspired by his parents, but he alleged that what inspired his lifetime of advocacy was hearing the antisemitic Catholic radio priest Father Charles Coughlin when he was nine years old. He learned then that there were people who hated him and other Jews just for who they were. He attended Emerson College in Boston, but dropped out to join the U.S. Air Force, where he flew 52 bombing missions over Europe. When grounded he would entertain his fellow airmen with comedy.


Lear described himself as a secular Jewish American, "as culturally Jewish as I could be and am proud to be Jewish, but I'm not a religionist of any kind." Though he had a bar mitzvah, he recalled it as more of a family party than a deeply religious experience. His identity significantly influenced his creative work and political activism. His Jewish background and experiences with antisemitism fueled his fight for equality and social justice throughout his career.

Beyond television, Lear actively supported causes such as civil rights, anti-poverty initiatives, and education reform. He founded People for the American Way (PFAW), a progressive advocacy organization formed in reaction to the politics of the Christian right. PFAW ran several advertising campaigns opposing the interjection of religion in politics. Prominent right-wing Christians have accused Lear of being an atheist and holding an anti-Christian bias.

Lear died in 2023 at the age of 101. Numerous celebrities paid tribute to him including Jimmy Kimmel, Bill Maher, Bil Clinton, Jon Stewart and many others. The Simpsons' episode 9 from the 35th season ends with the words "In memory of Norman Lear" and a picture of Lear where he is depicted as a character from the Simpsons.

BOOK REVIEW

The Boy on the Wooden Box


This memoir takes place in Poland prior to World War II. Until Leon was 9 years old, he and his family lived in the village of Narewka. After several months they moved to Krakow where they enjoyed the big city middle class life style.

In 1939, when the Nazis invaded Poland, Leon and his family's lives turned upside down. Their rights as Jews were taken away, and among other things, he could not go to school, and his father was not permitted to work. However, all at once, the family's fortune changed again when the father was hired by Oskar Schindler. Schindler was impressed by the father's work skills at his factory. Eventually, he also became impressed by the Leon's interest and mechanical skills, though he needed to stand on a box to reach the controls.

He didn't know it then but these eventually saved their lives, since Schindler was allowed to save his workers from extermination at the death camps.

This memoir tells a story of amazing perseverance and courage amidst horrible conditions and death. All of this is told through the eyes of a teenager and his family. It was memorialized in the movie, Schindler's List.
