## Co-Presidents' Message

We wish everyone a happy and healthy New Year. Many people have personal rituals for welcoming the new year. On New Year's Day some people take part in a "polar plunge" where participants immerse or swim in very cold or icy water. The motives for participating in a "polar plunge" range from fundraising, meeting a physical or mental challenge, or socially engaging with others. Many describe an intense rush of adrenaline and clarity at the moment of immersion which can have lasting emotional effects.



The experience on the whole is a metaphor for pushing beyond our comfort zones to do something new or different in the coming year, no matter how small. Challenges can range from listening to music outside our usually preferred genres, engaging in a new activity, or traveling to a new place. We can also think about new ways to work to engage with our communities in advancing Tikkun Olam. This can be done in small ways such as donating to a food bank or taking stands on social justice issues. Jews for Secular Democracy hosts regular webinars on various social issues.

Last month, our Chanukah celebration had a very good turnout. Attendees enjoyed each other's company along with a Chanukah feast with latkes, jelly donuts and delicious side dishes. Rather than do a gift exchange, this year attendees brought donations to a local food bank and unwrapped toys for children in need. # Jews to Know

## Peter Sichel

(September 12, 1922 – February 24, 2025)

Peter Sichel was a Jewish refugee from Nazi Germany who became the first CIA Station chief in post-war Berlin and a key player in Cold War espionage before taking over the family wine business and popularizing the Blue Nun wine label. His family managed to flee to France in 1939. A relative was able to get them to New York in April 1941. He volunteered for the U. S. Army the day after Pearl Harbor.

As a 19-year-old German émigré who spoke German, French and English he was quickly recruited to the Office of Strategic Services (OSS), the precursor to the CIA. He recruited German prisoners of war to infiltrate German lines and report back to him. A novel and film “Decision Before Dawn,” were written about one of these cases.

After the war, at the age of 23, Sichel became the OSS station chief in post-war Berlin. His intelligence uncovered that while the Soviet block of occupied Germany was not going to allow its residents to determine their political future as the Allies had agreed to. It also wasn’t going to invade any of the other occupied Germany zones.

Sichel worked as a spy for 17 years. First during the war in the OSS and then in the CIA from its inception until he resigned in 1959. He became disillusioned with the work as he believed that agents were sent into operations that had no chance of success and they were potentially being sent to their deaths. The common theme was sending agents behind enemy lines to instigate resistance to Communist regimes. This occurred in Albania, Ukraine and China. “There’s no attempt to learn from the past,” he said. “It’s an institutional mistake of this country.”


He also disagreed with covert efforts to depose political leaders in Iran and Guatemala. In “The Last Spy”, a documentary about his career in intelligence he said “If the intelligence doesn’t fit, they don’t believe the intelligence”.

Many of his agent colleagues thought that he would return to espionage after he left the CIA. Instead, he took over the family wine business. He inherited an antiquated and disorganized business and concentrated on promoting the company’s brands, primarily Blue Nun. It was called a liebfraumilch, meaning the milk of the Holy Mother, a generic term for Rhine wine. By the late 1980s, the world’s appetite for wine increased, but interest in branded wines like Blue Nun waned. Even with a business that was losing popularity, Peter Sichel, refugee, spy, wine merchant led a long and colorful life.

## BOOK REVIEW

### **The Jewish Godmother**

Klugh (pronounced same as clue) is a 17 year old boy growing up in New York. He is an extremely precocious guitar player as is his father, who has given lessons to a great many students, including Klugh. His mother was a music teacher also, but to elementary school students. Unfortunately both parents die and there is no other close relative left to raise Klugh, until his cousin Esther volunteers to do so. The problem is that she is Jewish and his parents are Catholic. Esther really wants to raise him, so she promises to raise him as a Catholic.

Things go relatively well until his estranged grandfather comes on the scene. He had been in prison and is violent and hostile. However, he wants to get custody of Klugh, mainly to get control of his inheritance which is sizable. In order to avoid this, Klugh and Esther escape out of town and stay in various locations. During this trip he rediscovers his guitar along with some skills he never knew he had. He also meets and develops a relationship with a girl who has a very positive influence on him when he needed it the most.

This book is well written and has many twists and turns. I would definitely recommend it.


